What is Sin?

Biblical Definition:

The word "sin" in the Bible is derived from the Hebrew term "chata" and the Greek term "hamartia", both of which carry the meaning of "missing the mark" or "falling short". In the biblical context, sin is an act of rebellion against God or a transgression of His laws and commands. It is the opposite of righteousness and is often described as a stain, pollution, or a debt that needs to be paid.

Hebrew Word for Sin: The Hebrew word for sin, "chata", is mentioned over 500 times in the Old Testament and is translated as "sin", "offense", "error", or "fault".

Greek Word for Sin:

The Greek word for sin, "hamartia", appears 173 times in the New Testament and is translated as "sin", "fault", or "offense". Its root is "hamartano", which means "to miss the mark" or "to err". This word first appears in the New Testament in **Matthew 1:21**, where it is used to describe Jesus as the one who will save His people from their sins.

In summary, Sin is our brokenness, sin is our separation from God, the cause of our fractured world, and our need for healing, our need to be born again. Sin is Disobedience toward God in thoughts, words, feelings, and actions.

How did sin enter the world? We will read Genesis Chapter 3

Who sinned in this scripture? What was sinful? What happened as a result of these sins? What relationships were hurt? Where do you see sin in our world today?

Fallen Nature of Humankind

Adam's sin has affected the human race - Romans 5:12. Because of this sin, we are born with a sinful nature that is hostile to God.

- Psalm 51:5, "Behold, I was brought forth in iniquity, and in sin did my mother conceive me."
- Romans 8:7, The mind governed by the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so.
- **Ephesians 2:1-5**, "And you were dead in the trespasses and sins in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience—among whom we all once lived in the passions of our flesh, carrying out the desires of the body and the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind. But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved."

- 1. Father of Lies: John 8:44 "You belong to your father, the devil, and you want to carry out your father's desires. He was a murderer from the beginning, not holding to the truth, for there is no truth in him. When he lies, he speaks his native language, for he is a liar and the father of lies."
- 2. Children of the Evil One: Matthew 13:38 "The field is the world, and the good seed stands for the people of the kingdom. The weeds are the people of the evil one."
- 3. Children of Hell: Matthew 23:15 "Woe to you, teachers of the law and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You travel over land and sea to win a single convert, and when you have succeeded, you make them twice as much a child of hell as you are."

- 4. Children of Darkness: Ephesians 5:8 "For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light."
- 5. Children of Disobedience: Ephesians 2:2 "In which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient."
- 6. Children of Wrath: Ephesians 2:3 "All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our flesh and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature deserving of wrath."

<u>Ephesians 1:7</u> - "In him, we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace."

<u>Romans 5:6-9</u> - Since we have now been justified by his blood (Atonement- Making things right with God)

<u>Romans 6: 1-11</u>: Paul says that Christ, through his death, destroyed the power of sin. Through Christ's resurrection, Christ destroyed the power of death. Paul says that we are baptized into Christ's death so that we can share in Christ's resurrection.

1 Peter 2:24- Not only did Jesus save us from our sins by dying on the cross, but Jesus also saved us for a life of righteousness.

Christ offers us Eternal Life - John - 3: 16,

Christ gives us new spiritual life - 2 Corinthians 5: 17

Christ gives us victory over Sin - 1 Corinthians 15:57

• Christ gives us the Holy Spirit - John 16:7-13
